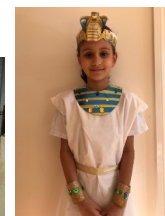
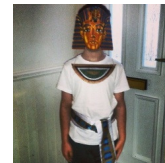
Year 3 The Romans – Thursday 24th March

Most Roman children wore a simple tunic, which was belted at the waist. Boys wore a tunic down to their knees and a cloak if it was cold. Rich boys could also wear a toga with a purple border. Girls would wear a tunic with a woollen belt that was tied around their waists.



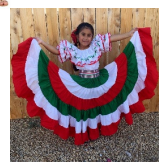
Year 4 The Egyptians – Thursday 24th March

The Ancient Egyptians wore **clothing made from linen**. Upper class children wore robes of white linen and sandals made of leather. The lower class peasants wore robes of dark cotton or woven reeds with woven sandals.



Year 5 Mexico – Monday 21st March

The most popular and well-known women's pieces of clothing in Mexico are their Mexican skirts. Huipil is a sleeveless tunic, made from cotton or wool. It is worn with a skirt. Sarape is a vibrantly coloured garment with a fringe. It is used as a shawl-like coat and as a blanket. Other suggestions are to wear skirts, trousers or blouses in the flag colours, or simply accent your clothing with scarves around your waist or neck.



Year 6 The Tudors – Friday 25th March

Poor people wore simple, loose-fitting clothes made from woollen cloth. Most men wore trousers made from wool and a tunic, which came down to just above their knee. Women wore a dress of wool that went down to the ground.

They often wore an apron over this and a cloth bonnet on their heads. Men wore white silk shirts with frills and a doublet, a tight-fitting jacket. Tudor children dressed like mini versions of adults, which meant heavy satin and ruffed necks.
