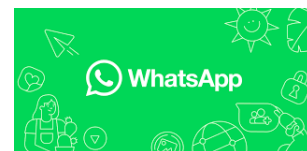

Online Safety:

Are you part of a parent WhatsApp group in your child's class?

These groups can be useful for sharing information and reminders, but it is important to use them thoughtfully.

Here are some tips on how we can ensure they remain positive and respectful:

1. Be considerate—we know messages can sometimes be misinterpreted so carefully think about what you share. These groups should not be used to share criticisms of the school, staff or other parents and children. Any concerns should always be discussed with the school directly.
2. Don't spread rumours— avoid sharing any gossip within the group.
3. Protect privacy- do not share photos or videos of other children.
4. Think before you send— be mindful of the time and if the message is necessary for everyone.

Our children watch how we communicate, so let's model healthy, online communication to them.

St Paul's Cathedral

Ivy Class braved the cold this week for a memorable visit to St Paul's Cathedral, as part of their RE curriculum: Local Christian Places of Worship. The trip gave the children a valuable opportunity to explore a significant Christian site and deepen their understanding of its history, purpose and importance within the local community.

During a fascinating workshop and guided tour, the children learned about the Cathedral's rich history, discovering that a church has stood on this very site for over 1,000 years. Many were amazed by how the building has changed over time and survived major events in London's history.

One of the highlights of the day was the climb up 376 steps to the Stone Gallery, with a stop at the famous Whispering Gallery along the way. Several children admitted they "felt a bit nervous about the height at first," but agreed that "the views from the top were totally worth it!" Others said their favourite part was "seeing London from so high up" and "learning surprising facts about the cathedral's past."

I would like to extend a big thank you to all the Ivy Class parent volunteers and Mr Kat for accompanying us and helping to make the trip such a success. It was a rewarding and inspiring day for everyone involved.

Mobile Phones

We are a "mobile free" school.

Please be reminded that mobile phones cannot be brought into school for any reason whatsoever. We strongly believe that children are more at risk when they carry and use a mobile phone than it being a deterrent. Our school policy reflects this and it is a rule that we enforce vigorously.

Any mobile phone brought into school will be taken and can only be collected by a parent/carer; repeat offenders will have their mobile phone held in the school office until the end of term.
